From IC trustee, Jenny Humphreys:

Over recent months many people have had to re-assess their lives due to unexpected circumstances, whether unemployment or ill-health. But even those whose situation has not been so extreme have been coping with changes to jobs, relationships, and memberships of organisations (including church). And many of us in lock-down were having clear-outs, either from our cupboards or by consolidating online files. Doing so reminded me it is 25 years since my licensing as a Reader in 1995, continuing with theological studies to degree level in 2003.

Those studies inspired my interest in inclusivity – for example modules in Black, Asian, Feminist, and Liberation Theology. Through them, and through my role as Diocesan World Mission Adviser, I became more aware of issues of ethnicity, global poverty, gender inequality and other structural injustices, all closely interlinked.

Has the world moved forward on all these issues since 1995? Raising awareness of Make Poverty History and the UN Millennium Development Goals gave me a glimpse of what might be possible if people worked together at every level.

But seeing the effects of climate change and the rise of racism and homophobia around the world makes me uneasy for the future. Even this global pandemic does not seem to inspire the world's politicians to put aside their differences and work for the good of all humanity. So Inclusive Church's work in raising awareness of the intersectionality of all these issues is increasingly important. Thank you for all that you and your church are doing to make God's world a more equitable place, and please see below for more ways to get involved.

Telling Encounters: Stories of Disability, Faith, Church and God

This year's Disability Conference was online for the first time ever. The feedback received has been overwhelmingly positive.
